

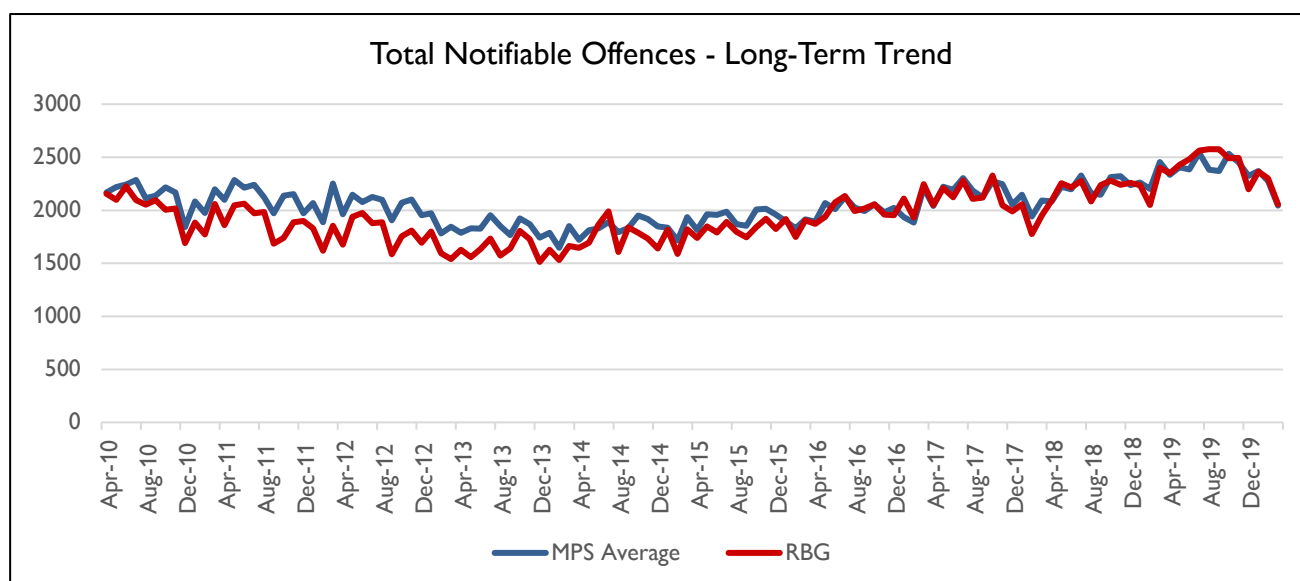

| <b>QUARTER FOUR 2019/20 PERFORMANCE REPORT</b> |                           |                     |

## 1. Purpose of the Report

- 1.1. To provide an update to the SGP on performance against key offence types, with a particular focus on those set by MOPAC as priorities for London and for the borough.
- 1.2. To provide an update on the actions set out in the 2019/20 Community Safety Plan.

## 2. Executive Summary

- 2.1. There were a total of 28,907 Offences in Royal Greenwich in the 12 months April 2019 to March 2020, an increase of 9.1% (+2,406) on the previous 12 months. The MPS recorded an increase of 5.5% over the same period. Royal Greenwich was 'ranked' 18<sup>th</sup> for the level of offences in the last 12 months (where 1 is the borough with the lowest level of offences), compared to 17<sup>th</sup> the previous 12 months.

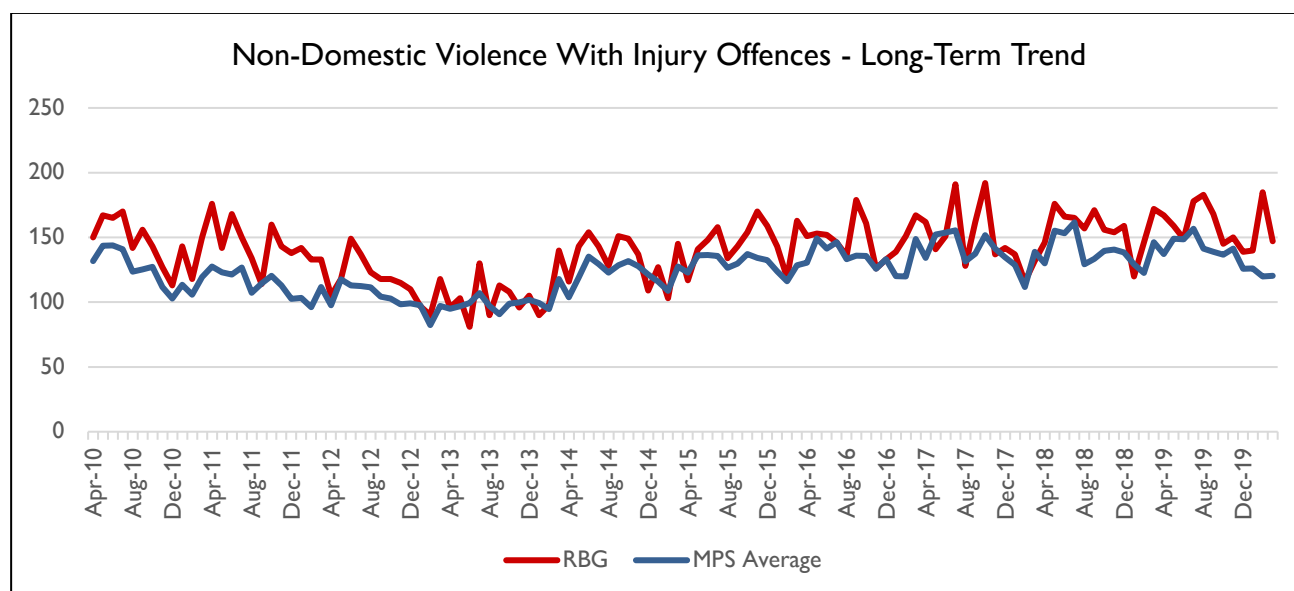

### Main Report

#### 4. Local Priorities

##### 4.1. Non Domestic Violence With Injury

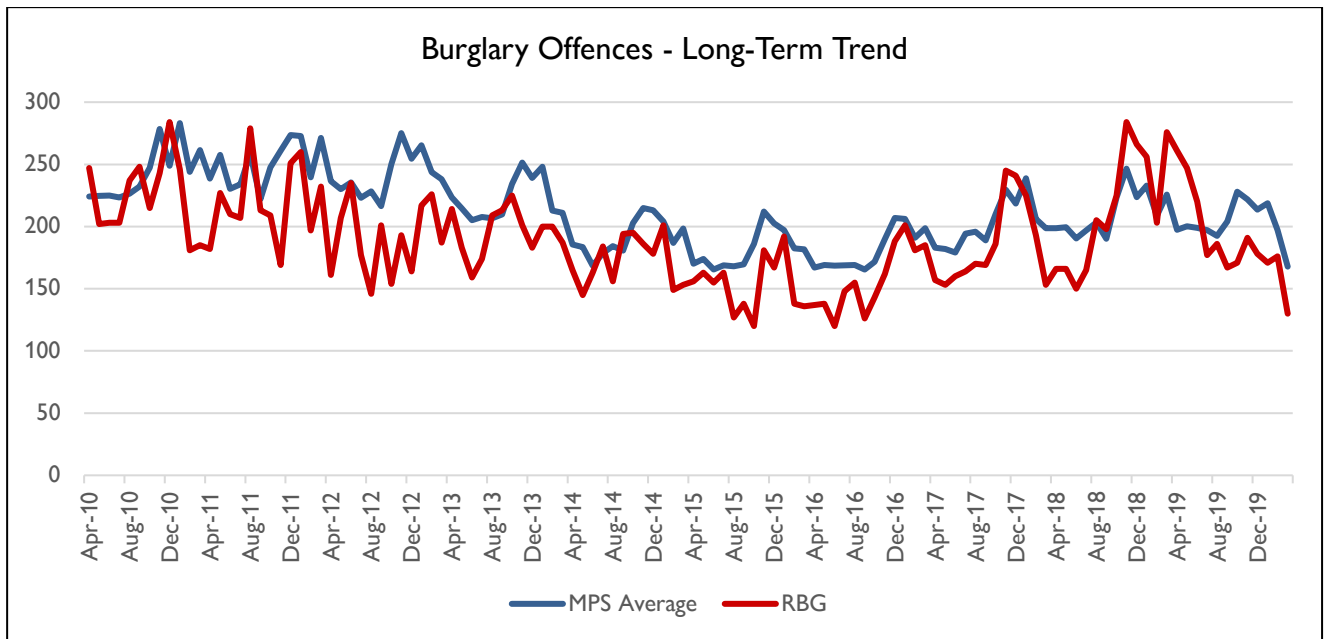
There were 1,910 Non-Domestic Violence With Injury Offences in Royal Greenwich in the 12 months April 2019 to March 2020, an increase of +1.2% (+22) on the previous 12 months. The MPS recorded a decrease of -2.3% over the same period. Royal Greenwich was 'ranked' 22<sup>nd</sup> for the level of offences in the last 12 months (where 1 is the borough with the lowest level of offences), compared to 20<sup>th</sup> the previous 12 months.



##### 4.2. Burglary

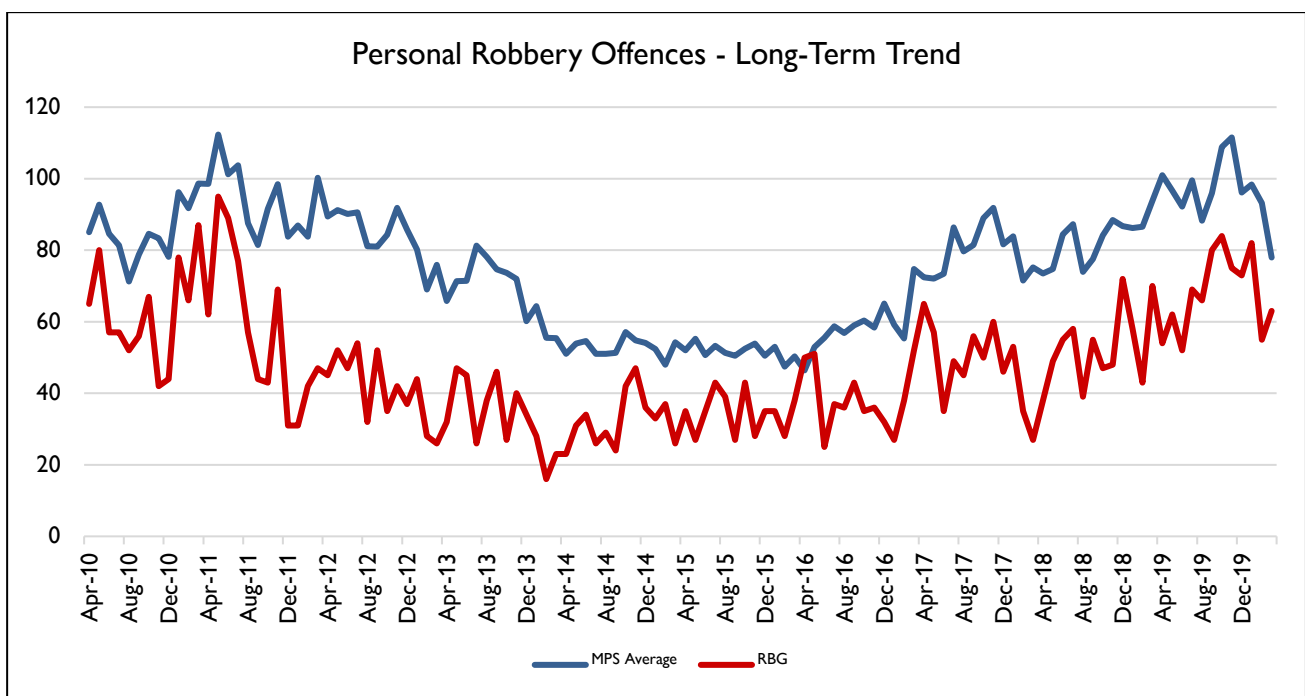
There were 2,276 Burglary Offences in Royal Greenwich in the 12 months April 2019 to March 2020, a decrease of -11.1% (-284) on the previous 12 months. The MPS recorded a decrease of -4.1% over the same period. Royal Greenwich was 'ranked' 15<sup>th</sup> for the level of offences in the last 12 months (where 1 is the borough with the lowest level of offences), which was the same ranking as in the previous 12 months.

(NB from 01/04/17 there has been a change in how burglary offences are recorded. Offences previously classified as Non-Residential Burglary, such as theft from sheds, are now classed as Residential Burglary. This change in definition accounts for some of the increase during this timeframe.)



### 4.3. Personal Robbery

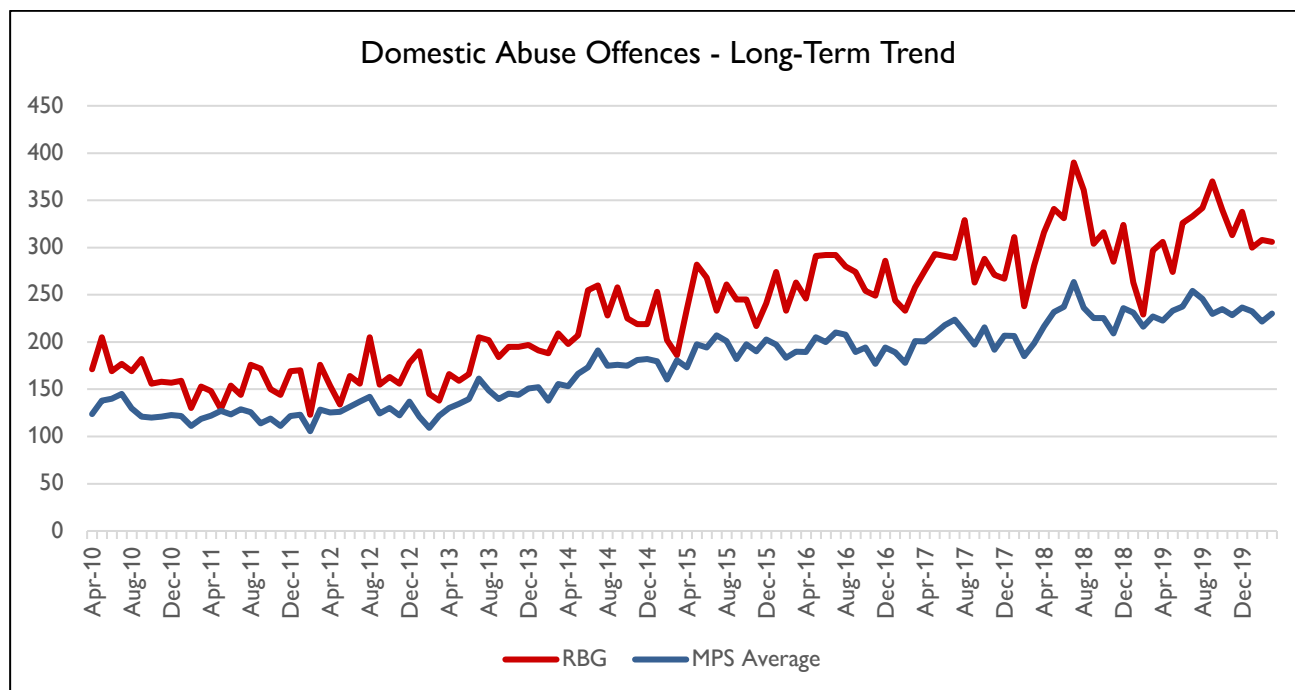
There were 817 Personal Robbery Offences in Royal Greenwich in the 12 months April 2019 to March 2020, an increase of 29.3% (+185) on the previous 12 months. The MPS recorded an increase of +16.2% over the same period. Royal Greenwich was 'ranked' 14<sup>th</sup> for the level of offences in the last 12 months (where 1 is the borough with the lowest level of offences), compared to 9<sup>th</sup> the previous 12 months.



## 5. London Wide Priorities

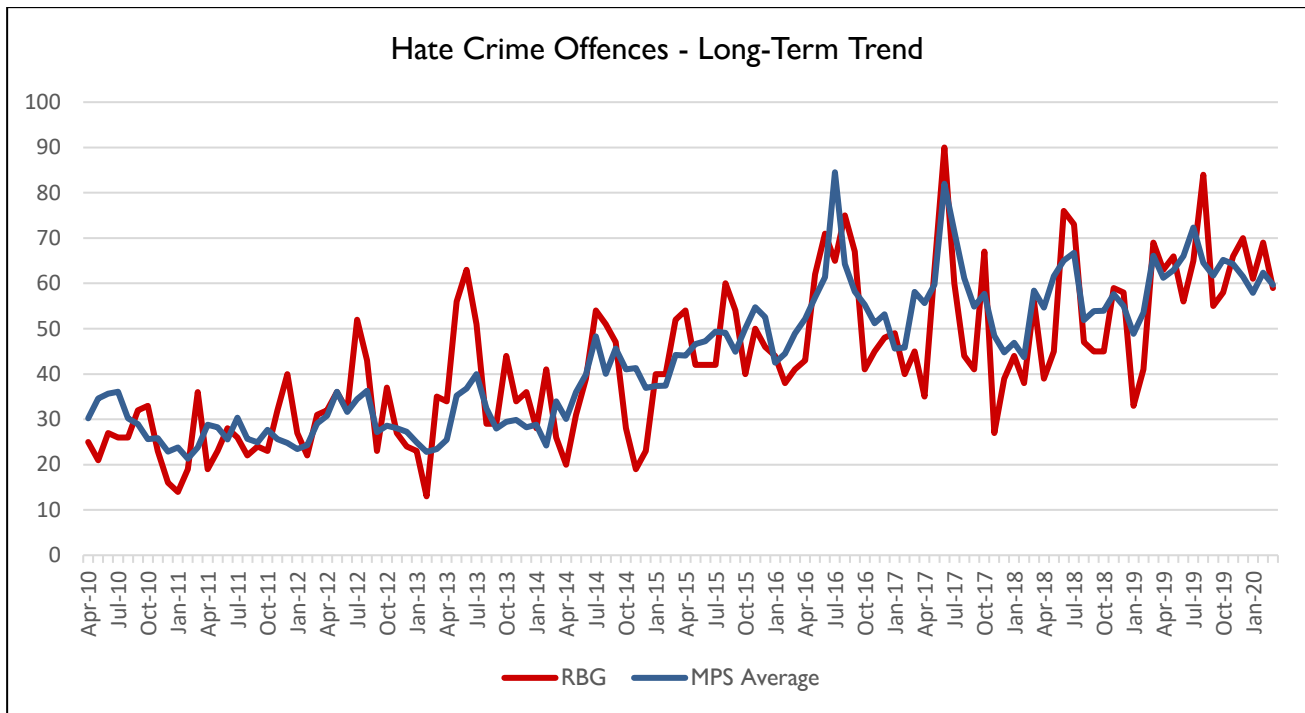
### 5.1. Domestic Abuse

There were 3,856 Domestic Abuse Offences in Royal Greenwich in the 12 months April 2019 to March 2020, an increase of +2.6% (+99) on the previous 12 months. The MPS recorded an increase of +1.9% over the same period. Royal Greenwich was 'ranked' 30<sup>th</sup> for the level of offences in the last 12 months (where 1 is the borough with the lowest level of offences), which was the same ranking as in the previous 12 months.



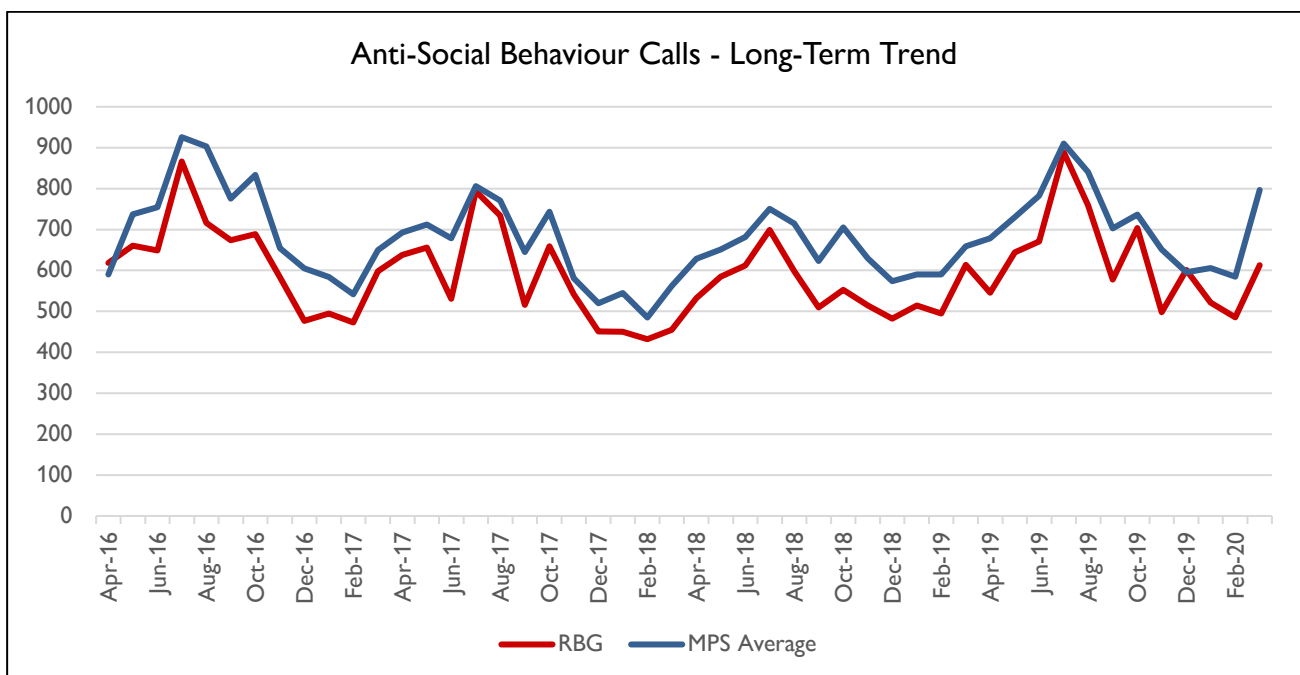
### 5.2. Hate Crime

There were 772 Hate Crime Offences in Royal Greenwich in the 12 months April 2019 to March 2020, an increase of +24.5% (+142) on the previous 12 months. The MPS recorded an increase of +10.3% over the same period. Homophobic hate crime saw the largest reduction in the period of -2.7% (-2). The largest increase was Racist and Religious hate crime at +27.8% (+138). Royal Greenwich was 'ranked' 18<sup>th</sup> for the level of offences in the last 12 months (where 1 is the borough with the lowest level of offences), compared to 15<sup>th</sup> in the previous 12 months.



**5.3. Anti-Social Behaviour**

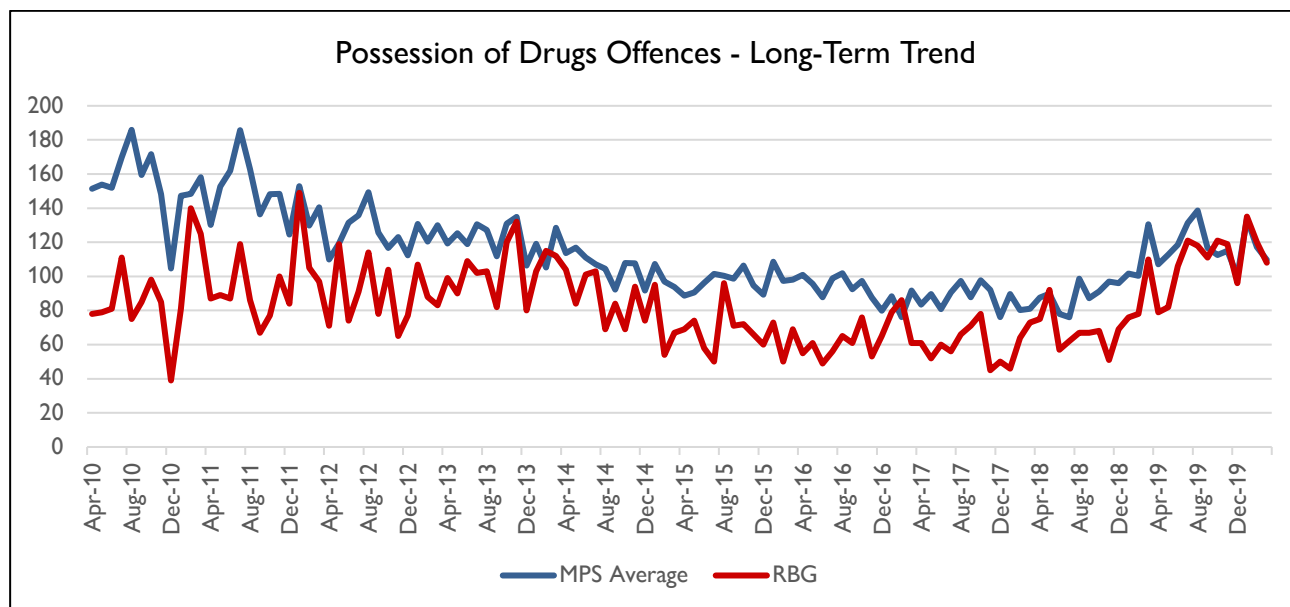
There were 7,509 Anti-Social Behaviour Calls in Royal Greenwich in the 12 months April 2019 to March 2020, an increase of +11.9% (+801) on the previous 12 months. The MPS recorded an increase of +10.5% over the same period. Royal Greenwich was 'ranked' 13<sup>th</sup> for the level of offences in the last 12 months (where 1 is the borough with the lowest level of offences) compared to 12<sup>th</sup> in the previous 12 months.



## 6. Royal Greenwich London Wide Priorities

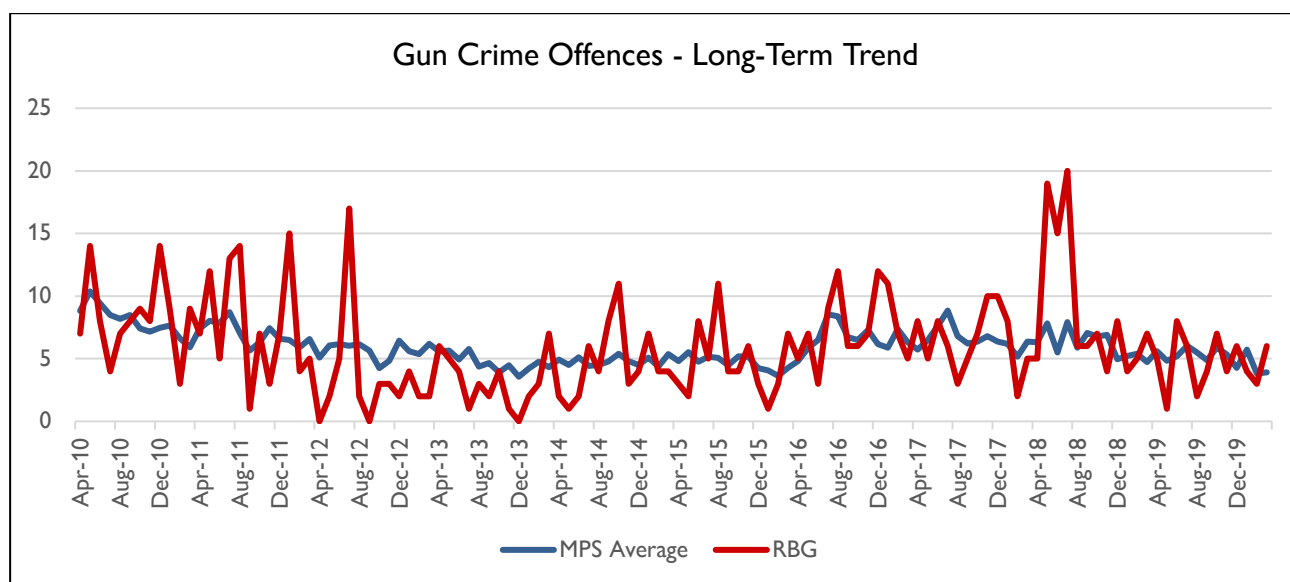
### 6.1. Possession of Drugs Offences

There were 1,295 Possession of Drugs Offences in Royal Greenwich in the 12 months April 2019 to March 2020, an increase of +49% (+426) on the previous 12 months. The MPS recorded an increase of +23.8% over the same period. Royal Greenwich was 'ranked' 18<sup>th</sup> for the level of offences in the last 12 months (where 1 is the borough with the lowest level of offences) compared to 12<sup>th</sup> in the previous 12 months.



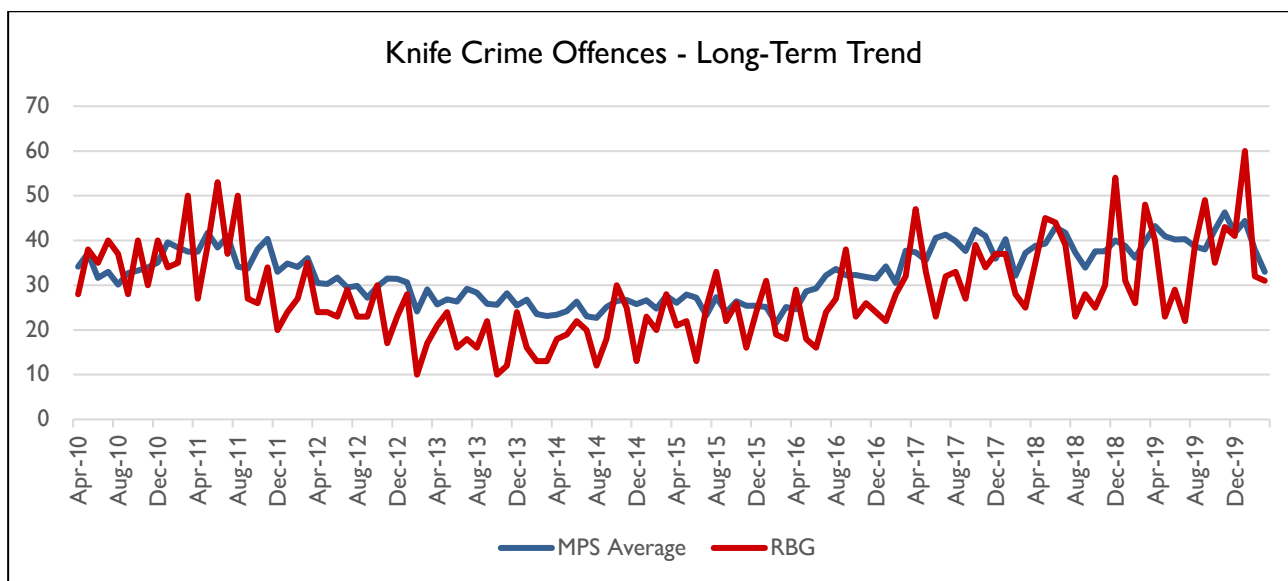
### 6.2. Gun Crime

There were 58 Gun Crime Offences in Royal Greenwich in the 12 months April 2019 to March 2020, a decrease of -45% (-47) on the previous 12 months. The MPS recorded a decrease of -19% over the same period. Royal Greenwich was 'ranked' 15<sup>th</sup> for the level of offences in the last 12 months (where 1 is the borough with the lowest level of offences) compared to 24<sup>th</sup> in the previous 12 months.



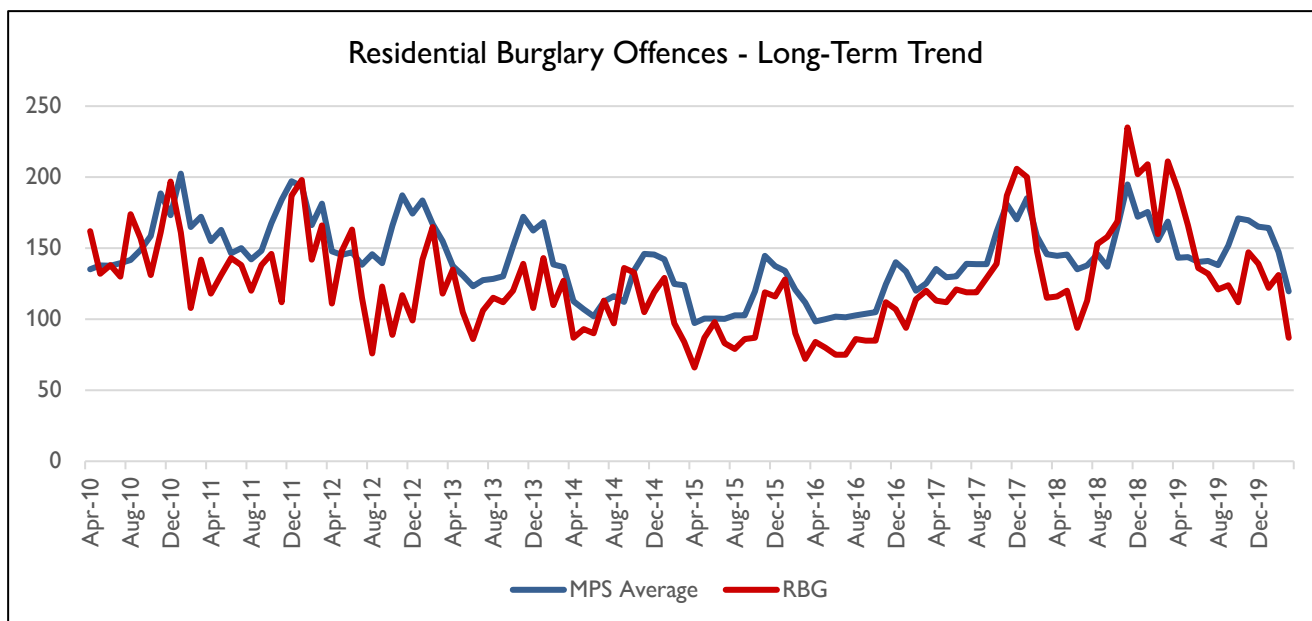
### 6.3. Knife Crime

There were 427 Knife Crime Offences in Royal Greenwich in the 12 months April 2019 to March 2020, an increase of +4% (+16) on the previous 12 months. The MPS recorded an increase of +5% over the same period. Royal Greenwich was 'ranked' 17<sup>th</sup> for the level of offences in the last 12 months (where 1 is the borough with the lowest level of offences) compared to 13<sup>th</sup> in the previous 12 months.



**6.4. Residential Burglary**

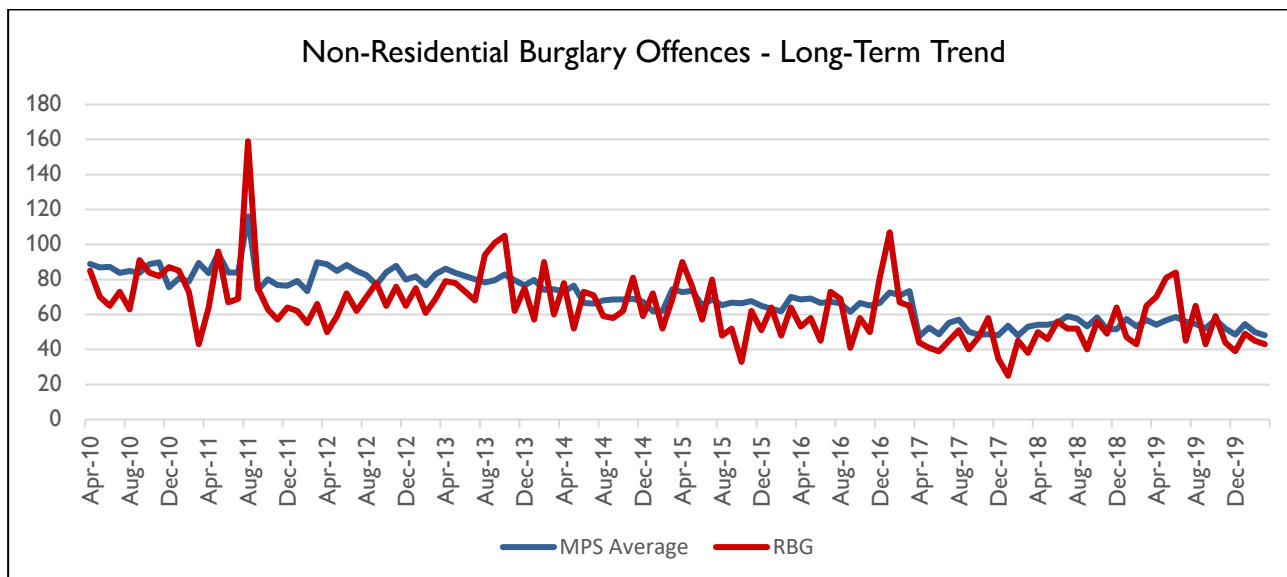
There were 1,609 Residential Burglary Offences in Royal Greenwich in the 12 months April 2019 to March 2020, a decrease of -17.1% (-331) on the previous 12 months. The MPS recorded a decrease of -4.4% over the same period. Royal Greenwich was 'ranked' 14<sup>th</sup> for the level of offences in the last 12 months (where 1 is the borough with the lowest level of offences) compared to 16<sup>th</sup> in the previous 12 months.



**6.5. Non-Residential Burglary**

There were 667 Non-Residential Burglary Offences in Royal Greenwich in the 12 months April 2019 to March 2020, an increase of +7.6% (+47) on the previous 12

months. The MPS recorded a decrease of -3% over the same period. Royal Greenwich was 'ranked' 24<sup>th</sup> for the level of offences in the last 12 months (where 1 is the borough with the lowest level of offences) compared to 19<sup>th</sup> in the previous 12 months.



## 7. Community Safety Plan Quarter 4 update

- 7.1. This section of the report advises the Safer Greenwich Partnership on the progress made during 2019-20 on the Community Safety Plan that was agreed for the Partnership's six strategic priorities it set for the year.
- 7.2. The priorities in the plan were:
  - Creating and Sustaining Safer Public Spaces
  - Tackling Hate Crime and Supporting the Vulnerable and Repeat Victims
  - Ending Violence Against Women and Girls
  - Preventing and Reducing the Harm from Serious Violence and Gangs
  - Disrupting Drug Dealing and Reducing the Harm it Causes to Individuals and Communities
  - Reducing the Harm that Alcohol Causes
- 7.3. There were 83 actions from the 2019/2020 Community Safety plan. At the end of Quarter 4 partners' updates show that 17 (20%) have been completed, while another 43 (51%) are still in progress and 20 (24%) are ongoing actions. The ongoing actions are slightly different to those which are in progress as the ongoing actions are those that will continue without an end date, whereas the 'in progress' actions are those where once implemented fully, will be complete. Only 2 actions could not start and 1 was cancelled.
- 7.4. The most common reason for actions not being completed is quarter 4 saw RBG go into lockdown due to the Covid-19 pandemic, therefore some actions had to be suspend till normality resumes. Another reason is that it transpired that some actions were ongoing rather than in progress, which means they have and will become business as usual actions. Some of these ongoing actions will be reviewed and refreshed, however still plan to continue with the works for the foreseeable future.



7.5. The table below give a summary of the status of all actions within the Community Safety Plan, broken down by status.
