I am writing to object to this application on the grounds of prevention of crime and disorder , prevention of public nuisance and public safety.

This application, which seeks to permit use of an extra two floors for licensable activity, will increase the numbers of customers at the riverside venue bringing with it more noise and congestion to this residential area.

Demand for parking is likely to increase on nearby already heavily parked roads.

The extra capacity is likely to increase the potential for crime and disorder with fears for public safety putting extra strains on already stretched police resources.

I understand the Tavern is now subject to planning enforcement action being taken against it in relation to the unauthorised placing of tables and chairs along the historic Thames riverside .

I urge the Committee to refuse the Application.

Dear Licensing,

Thank you for contacting me about the application for the Trafalgar Tavern to use an additional two floors for licensable activities.

I am writing to object to this application on the grounds of prevention of crime and disorder, prevention of public nuisance and public safety. If the application is approved, it will significantly increase the capacity of this venue and the number of customers it attracts. Local residents already complain about the behaviour of customers at this venue. This allegedly includes noise from people congregating and smoking outside. Public urination, playing of music on mobile devices and broken bottles left on the street. Residents who have asked the clientele to be more quiet as they leave claim to have been threatened and then there are the endless stream of Private Hire Vehicles and 'after parties' the clientele hold in the street. Increasing the capacity of the premises will increase the capacity of these problems for residents.

I am not convinced that the establishment is well-run, considering my understanding that planning enforcement action is being taken against them, or is likely to be taken soon, regarding some outdoor seating. I personally witnessed the police attending the Trafalgar Tavern during lockdown restrictions when only off sales were allowed and understand that the pub was fined for breaching COVID-19 regulations at least once. Expanding the venue is likely to stretch police resources further.

I urge the Committee to refuse the application.
